Chagrin Arts' Chautauqua-in-Chagrin™ Series takes a look at moral and ethical issues in medicine on June 19

CHAGRIN FALLS, OHIO –Chagrin Arts' 2018 *Chautauqua-in-Chagrin™* Lecture Series will continue on June 19 with a focus on moral and ethical issues in medicine. The program will take place from 6:30 – 8:00 PM at the Chagrin Falls United Methodist Church, located at 20 S. Franklin, St., Chagrin Falls, Ohio. The focus of this year's *Chautauqua-in-Chagrin™* Series is "Let's Talk: Exploring Moral and Ethical Issues Surrounding Race, Medicine, Cybersecurity and Free Speech." The June 19 program will feature a panel of experts in the medical field who will respond to audience questions relating to end-of-life care, use of addictive drugs, defensive medicine and more. The format of this program is strictly Q&A.

Panelists include: James W. Campbell, MD, MS—Chair of the Geriatrics Department and Co-Medical Director of MetroHealth's Accountable Care Organization; Laura Hoeksema, MD, MPH—Associate Medical Director of Cleveland Clinic Hospice; and Susannah Rose, PhD—Director of Research at the Cleveland Clinic Center for Bioethics' Office of Patient Experience.

Additionally, the Chagrin Falls Library will host its Young Explorers Program at the Chagrin Falls Library at 100 E. Orange St., Chagrin Falls, Ohio. The June 19 program focuses on "Education," one of the four pillars of the Chautauqua Movement and is open to children in Kindergarten through 5th grade. ABOUT JAMES W. CAMPBELL

James Campbell, MD, MS, is a Cleveland native who completed undergraduate studies at the University of Michigan Honors College in 1980. He received his medical degree at the University of Cincinnati (1984) and followed with a residency in family medicine and fellowship in geriatrics at Case Western Reserve University, University Hospitals of Cleveland, and the Louis Stokes Cleveland Veteran's Administration Medical Center. Dr. Campbell completed a Master's in Clinical Epidemiology and Statistics at the University of Michigan in 1992.

Dr. Campbell led the Geriatric Evaluation and Management Unit at the Cleveland VA Medical Center from 1989 through 1993. During this time, he helped initiate Silver Pathways, one of the first alcohol treatment programs for older adults. In 1993, he moved to MetroHealth to lead the development of a geriatrics program. He was appointed Chair of Family Medicine in 1999, a position he proudly held until 2010. During this time, Dr. Campbell developed a large and successful geriatric academic program at MetroHealth and spearheaded the design and opening of the Senior Health & Wellness Center, a 225,000 square foot facility devoted to the comprehensive care of geriatric patients. In 2010, he was named Director, Geriatric Center at the Senior Health & Wellness Center and in 2017, Chair of Geriatrics. This Center is comprised of 14 board-certified geriatricians and six geriatric nurse practitioners. In addition to delivering 26,000 outpatient visits, the geriatric service provides medical direction to seven nursing facilities and has over 20,000 long term care visits each year. Dr. Campbell is a Professor of Family Medicine at Case Western Reserve University School of Medicine, Chair of Geriatrics, the Co-Medical Director of MetroHealth's Accountable Care Organization and the Medical Director of the Jennings Center for Older Adults in Garfield Heights, Ohio.

Dr. Campbell has published numerous articles and book chapters in the areas of substance abuse in elders, physician home care, and geriatric trauma. His research efforts have focused on these same areas of interest and, most recently, on preparing faculty and physicians-in-training to practice in a quality-driven, patient-centered model of care delivery. In collaboration with the SOROS Foundation, MetroHealth Family Medicine and Geriatrics has done training for health care professionals in Eastern Europe.

Dr. Campbell was selected in 2002 by the John A. Hartford Foundation as one of 11 Geriatric Leadership Scholars and, in 2008, as a Practice Change Fellow. He has served on the Board of the American Geriatrics Society and the National Chronic Care Consortium. He has been President of the Ohio Geriatrics Society and Co-Chair of the Council on State-Affiliate Representatives. He is the recipient of the CWRU School of Medicine Teaching Innovation/Excellence Award and, in 2006, he was honored by Menorah Park Center with the prestigious Dr. Arnold L. Heller Memorial Award.

ABOUT LAURA HOEKSEMA

Dr. Laura Hoeksema trained in internal medicine and preventive medicine and received fellowship training in patient safety at the VA National Center for Patient Safety in addition to completing a Hospice and Palliative Medicine fellowship at Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit.

She obtained a master's degree in bioethics prior to attending medical school and received a master's degree in public health from the Yale School of Public Health during residency training.

She joined the Cleveland Clinic in 2014 and is currently an associate medical director with Cleveland Clinic Hospice; associate program director for the Hospice and Palliative Medicine fellowship; Clinical Assistant Professor of Medicine, Cleveland Clinic Lerner College of Medicine and Medical Director of Malachi House, a loving home for individuals at the end of life who need an available caregiver and have limited or no financial resources.

Dr. Hoeksema is a member of the hospital ethics committee and is committed to relieving suffering at the end of life for patients and their families.

ABOUT SUSANNAH ROSE

Susannah Rose joined the Professional Staff at Cleveland Clinic in 2011, and is currently the Scientific Director of Research in the Office of Patient Experience. She is an Assistant Professor at Cleveland Clinic's Lerner College of Medicine and in the Department of Bioethics at Case Western Reserve University, where she teaches healthcare economics, population-based bioethics, and national and international comparative health policy. She is also an Instructor at Harvard University's T.H. Chan School of Public Health, where she teaches public health ethics.

She received her Ph.D. from Harvard University's Health Policy Program (with a concentration in Ethics) in 2010. She specialized in applying normative ethics to healthcare policy-making in the U.S, and she developed an expertise in direct data collection methodologies and quantitative data analysis. While at Harvard, she received multiple awards and competitive fellowships: Dr. Rose was a National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH) pre-doctoral research fellow; a Harvard Edmond J. Safra Center for Ethics Graduate Fellow; a Safra post-doctoral lab fellow; and she was also a pre- and postdoctoral fellow at Massachusetts General Hospital, sponsored by the National Cancer Institute (NCI) through the Program in Cancer Research Outcomes Training (PCORT).

Prior to her doctoral studies, she earned an MS in Bioethics from Union College/Albany Medical Center in 2006, and a MS in Social Work from Columbia University in 1998. Dr. Rose worked as a clinical social worker and researcher at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center in New York City, specializing in the psychosocial issues surrounding cancer.

During her career, Dr. Rose has received multiple mentorship and teaching awards. She has published two books focused helping patients and family members cope with cancer, and she has published and presented in academic venues on topics related to conflicts of interest in medicine, health policy ethics, oncology and clinical bioethics. Her publications have appeared in high-ranked peer-reviewed journals, such as: JAMA Internal Medicine, Journal of General Internal Medicine (JGIM), The Journal of Clinical Oncology, The New England Journal of Medicine (NEJM), and PLOS One, and her book chapters on health policy ethics and end of life care have been published by the Oxford University Press. In addition to presenting at health policy conferences, such as AcademyHealth, she regularly presents at the American Society for Bioethics and Humanities (ASBH).

Her current research focuses upon the ethics of transparency (including conflicts of interest reporting, expanded patient access to medical records and online physician ratings), patient experience, and testing the impact of innovations in technology, communication and end-of-life care on health outcomes and patient satisfaction. These areas of research have been generously funded by multiple funding sources, including Harvard University's Edmond J. Safra Center for Ethic, NIH's Clinical & Translational Science Collaborative (CTSC) at Cleveland Clinic & Case Western Reserve University, and most recently, from The Greenwall Foundation.
